
### Part of the world-renowned University of London



### London on a budget

Goldsmiths is about five minutes by train from London Bridge. From there, you have the following and more - within a short walking distance:

- The Shard the tallest building in London
- · Tower Bridge

And we're only 15 minutes by Overground train from East London, where you can explore:

- Shoreditch and Dalston, for restaurants, nightlife and vintage shopping

### Safety and security

Crime rates in New Cross and the Borough of Lewisham are average for London, and lower than in some central and northern areas of the city.\* As with any city in the world, it's important you look after yourself and your belongings when you're out and about. Goldsmiths' halls of residence have Resident Assistants, office or security staff on hand 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

### **Getting around**

New Cross is an excellent transport hub, making it easy to access and enjoy everything London has to offer. Goldsmiths is just three minutes' walk from New Cross and New Cross Gate stations, in travelcard Zone 2 on the rail and London Overground network. We are also on major bus routes and 10 minutes' walk from Deptford Bridge station on the Docklands Light Railway (DLR).

New Cross Gate is also on the National Express coach route and there is a good local network of reliable 24-hour buses for getting home later in the evening.

### 18+ Student Oyster card

Oyster cards are plastic smartcards for travel, which you can top up at a wide range of shops, post offices and stations, and are handier for travel than carrying cash and paying for paper tickets. They are also the cheapest way to pay for single journeys by bus, tube, tram, DLR and train services across London. An 18+ Student Oyster photocard gives you discount on many tickets, and you're eligible to apply for one if you're studying full-time for more than six months.

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### NEW CROSS AND SOUTH-EAST LONDON

There are plenty of interesting neighbourhoods around New Cross, full of exciting nightlife, tranquil parks and bustling markets.

Our fascinating campus is made up of listed and traditional buildings, modern spaces, and even a repurposed church and town hall. It's a great metaphor for Goldsmiths itself – diverse, curious, and inventive.

### Our campus

Goldsmiths has a beautiful campus in New Cross, comprising old and new buildings, and open green spaces. Many of our halls of residence (see page 22-23) are within walking distance of the University.

### **New Cross**

There are many great places to eat, drink and socialise in New Cross, including an eclectic range of independent cafés, restaurants, pubs, cocktail bars and club nightspots. You can also enjoy top stand-up comedy and live bands, fringe theatre and art exhibitions at various local venues, or head to nearby Telegraph Hill for a lovely park and amazing views over the entire city of London. ### <u>Deptford</u>

Take just a 10-minute walk from Goldsmiths to find vendors at Deptford Market selling food from around the world. The area also has a strong creative community and is home to many galleries and filmmakers. It also hosts the Deptford X arts festival: www.deptfordx.org

### Greenwich

Home of the Cutty Sark, and Henry VIII's favourite London residence. Greenwich is famed for its markets, cinemas, bars, comedy nights, the National Maritime Museum and its huge Royal Park. It's also ideal for a stroll along the banks of the Thames.

### **Brockley**

Nearby Brockley is home to many students and young professionals, and has lots of independent bars and shops. There's a fantastic weekly food market, and one of London's best fringe theatres, Brockley Jack, is here. You may also spot a celebrity or two walking their dogs on Hilly Fields, which has great views across the city.

### **Peckham**

Street food stalls, bargain cinema, late-night bars, boutiques and pound shops - that's Peckham. During the summer months the top level of the multi-storey car park off Rye Lane hosts the pop-up Frank's Café and Campari Bar. The views from 10 storeys up are unmissable.

### **Camberwell**

This area has a great mix of student-friendly shops, restaurants and bars, including the South London Gallery, with a cosy café.

### **Brixton**

With its small independent bars and restaurants in Brixton Village, and its well-loved music venues like Dogstar and the O2 Academy, Brixton guarantees entertainment with a difference.







### Halls of residence - on and off campus

Living in halls is a great opportunity to meet people from all over the world. We offer self-catered accommodation with single occupancy rooms within easy commuting distance of the campus, and many halls are within walking distance of Goldsmiths (see the map on page 22-23 for details). Some studio flats are also available.

Rent includes most utility bills and basic possessions insurance, and staff are on hand 24 hours a day, seven days a week to help with any issues. Halls are managed by Goldsmiths or in partnership with a private provider. Once you've applied for a place at Goldsmiths, we'll send you more information about applying for halls of residence.

The fees for 2016-17 accommodation were not available at the time of print, but you can find the latest information on our accommodation fees - and details of how to apply - on our website.

### University student homes managed by the University of London

The University of London Housing Services (ULHS) can find and manage accommodation in flats and houses for you. This means you can live independently with the reassurance of having the ULHS as your landlord. Rent is competitive, and the properties allocated for Goldsmiths students are within an easy commute of the Goldsmiths campus.

The ULHS also offers Goldsmiths students free comprehensive advice on private renting, and offers contract checking and housing fairs.

### Privately rented flats and houses

Renting your own flat or house means you choose the type of accommodation you prefer, and get to decide where you live and who you share with. South-East London is reasonably priced compared to other parts of the capital. The names of areas surrounding the campus can be found on the map on pages 22-23 and should assist you when looking for private accommodation.

### Couples and families

### Accessible accommodation


If you have specific accessibility requirements, contact our Accommodation team. They'll be happy to help.

Qualified coaches run all sessions, and Goldsmiths will support you if you'd like to train to be a coach or official.

We also have a gym on campus. Club Pulse has state-of-the-art fitness equipment and a variety of classes at affordable prices - from group cycling, aerobics and yoga, to street dance and capoeira. You can also use our tennis and netball courts, and play rugby or football on the back field. We also have a larger sports facility in nearby Sidcup, which has provision for three football teams and one rugby team in the winter season, and a cricket square in the summer.

### <u>Immigration Advisory Service</u>

The Immigration Advisory Service at Goldsmiths is here to support you from the very start of your journey with us, through to graduation and beyond. We offer appointments, web chats, webinars, workshops and visa drop-in sessions throughout the year to help with any visa questions. ### <u>Your academic department</u>

Your department will provide a personal tutor, who will support you academically and advise you on other support services. There's also a Departmental Student Coordinator - a fellow student who can advise and represent you on academic issues.

### Welfare

From checking your housing contract and helping with budgeting, to providing support if you're struggling with essay deadlines - the Students' Union can give confidential advice on all sorts of things. There's also a dedicated Welfare and Diversity Officer and an Education Officer based in the Union.

### The Student Centre

The Student Centre provides a wide range of services and support in one location.

Specialist staff can help with all sorts of problems, and run events and activities to help you make the most out of your time at Goldsmiths. If you have any questions or concerns, just get in touch and they'll point you in the right direction.

### Advice

We offer a confidential advice service for support with welfare matters like finance, consumer issues and housing.

### Learning support

This team can advise you about any aspect of disability, including the support and accommodation available to make sure you have full access to the teaching and learning on your degree. They are the point of contact for any queries you have before you submit your application. We work hard to ensure that, as far as possible, areas of the campus are accessible to people with mobility difficulties. If you have such difficulties we recommend that you visit the campus so that we can show you around and discuss appropriate solutions. The team can also support students who may need assistance due to a temporary illness or injury, or who may need additional learning support for any other reason.

The Learning Support Team also manages the Assistive Technology Centre (ATC). This is an open-access computer workstation/study room for all students with a disability, specific learning difficulty or health-related problems that make studying difficult.

If you declare on your application form that you have a disability, we'll write to you and ask for more information. This will help us assess how we can best arrange the support you may need. This part of your application process is entirely independent of your academic assessment, and we only consider it once we've decided to offer you a place at Goldsmiths. ### Wellbeing

Our wellbeing team helps students with emotional or personal issues affecting their mental health. We run workshops and activities throughout the year to promote mental health - covering topics from 'finding your voice' to meditation.

### <u>Postgraduate</u> research students

If you are doing an MPhil/PhD we offer training in scholarship, academic skills and methods of research to support you in becoming an academic researcher, writer, teacher and publicly engaged intellectual. You will have a main supervisor and a second supervisor. During your first three months at Goldsmiths your supervisors will help you draw up a research plan and set detailed objectives for the first year.

### **Training opportunities**

In your first year you'll undertake training to develop your research skills and techniques. Some of this training will be through supervision, while some departments organise discipline-specific seminars and training courses. In addition, the Graduate School offers interdisciplinary core research training.

We also support you in thinking about how to plan for life after your PhD, and offer courses for early career researchers, or for anyone who is planning to become an academic.

### **Graduate School**

The Goldsmiths Graduate School can support you throughout your studies, giving you advice and direction where needed. It also provides dedicated research facilities and training to make sure you're well equipped for the challenges of graduate research and offers funds to enable you to attend conferences and conduct research at other institutions.

### **FACILITIES**

Our single-site campus means our impressive learning facilities are all in one place. These include a library that's open 24 hours a day, seven days a week during term time. We also provide open-access computers with the latest software.

### **Enhancing your learning**

As a Goldsmiths student, you can borrow books from the University of London Library, Senate House, and from other institutions within the University of London, including our own library on campus.

We have PC and Mac computers around the campus for accessing the web, emailing and sharing files remotely using our campus wireless network. Our virtual learning environment, 'Learn.Gold', gives you access to online learning activities and materials.

You can borrow audio-visual equipment like cameras, lighting equipment and projectors from our Media Equipment Centre. Our Digital Media Suite provides video and audio-editing software, and soundproof editing booths.

We also have an in-house print room, which offers digital printing and finishing services - perfect for producing colour portfolios and other creative work.

### **Department facilities**

Many of our academic departments have their own facilities including:

- studio space and research labs for casting, constructed textiles, fine-art printmaking, media research, metal, photography, print and dye, stitch and fabric, and woodwork in the Department of Art
- workshops with the latest digital equipment, computing suites and studio space in the Department of Design
- photography, radio and TV studios, plus the latest digital video and audio editing equipment, ENPS (essential news production system) facilities, animation and image manipulation software and hardware in the Department of Media and Communications
- pioneering sound studios, including the Electronic Music Studio and a commercial-standard recording studio in the Department of Music
- research laboratories including EEG and brain stimulation labs for neuroscience research, an infant lab, and a visual perception and attention laboratory in the Department of Psychology
- a 160-seat theatre, performance studios, a scenography workshop, wardrobe and props stores in the Department of Theatre and Performance
- labs with the latest technology and software in the Department of Computing

### **Eating and drinking**

There are lots of places to eat and drink on campus - whether you want to grab a coffee, take away a snack, or sit down with friends for a hot meal.

The Refectory is Goldsmiths' newly refurbished canteen, while Loafers Café and The Pod also serve food and drinks. The Professor Stuart Hall Building Café overlooks the picturesque College Green, and the Library Café sells Fairtrade snacks and drinks to feed your brain while you're studying.

### **Goldsmiths International Pathways**

The International Foundation Certificate (for undergraduate study) and Pre-Masters pathways (for postgraduate study) give students substantial English language development opportunities, as well as time to become familiar with UK academic culture.

### Pre-sessional English language summer programmes

These programmes are for international students who have a place on an undergraduate or postgraduate degree programme at Goldsmiths starting the following September and want or need to improve their English language skills before arriving. ### English language support during your studies

### In-sessional academic language development courses

These classes are for students enrolled on Goldsmiths degrees. All in-sessional courses are designed to develop your language and study skills in line with the academic tasks you will face on your degree.

### Courses aim to:

- give you an awareness of the conventions and requirements of traditional academic writing and presentations
- help you expand and develop language that applies in your area of study
- familiarise you with other written genres (for example, letters requesting sponsorship, non-traditional creative essay forms, or exam techniques)

Courses run for two hours each week during the autumn and spring terms, and in many cases relate directly to your subject of study.

As well as courses for second-language speakers, some departments also arrange short workshops on academic conventions and study skills for first-language speaking students.

You can also book an hour with one of our resident Royal Literary Fellows - professional writers who can help you improve your essay-writing skills.

### ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

The information to the right outlines the English language test scores we require for acceptance onto undergraduate and postgraduate programmes at Goldsmiths. Our minimum entry requirement for undergraduate

programmes is IELTS 6.5 (with a minimum of 6.0 in any individual test). For postgraduate programmes, our typical entry requirement is IELTS 6.5 (with a minimum of 6.5 in the written test). Some programmes require higher IELTS grades, please see our online prospectus entries for full details: www.gold.ac.uk/study

If you don't meet the language condition of your offer, you may attend one of our Pre-sessional English Language courses. For this, you will need an IELTS certificate from a UK Visas and Immigration approved test centre. If you have any queries, contact us on immigration@gold.ac.uk

Please note, IELTS and other English language proficiency qualifications are not acceptable in place of GCSE English for Initial Teacher Education programmes. See pages 94-95 for details.

You'll need to show us your original English language test score certificate, which should be less than two years old at the time of registering for your degree.

### **Computing degrees**

For most undergraduate computing programmes (see pages 82-83) the English language requirement is IELTS 6.0 overall (with no individual test lower than 5.5).

### **BA Fine Art Extension Degree**

For our undergraduate Fine Art Extension Degree (page 67) the English language requirement is IELTS 5.0 overall (with no individual test lower than 5.0).

### Masters degrees, Postgraduate Diplomas and Postgraduate Certificates

You should normally have (or expect to be awarded) an undergraduate degree of at least second class standard (or international equivalent) in a relevant subject.

### MRes programmes

You should normally have (or expect to be awarded) an undergraduate degree of at least upper second class standard (or international equivalent) in a relevant subject.

### MPhil/PhD programmes

You should normally have (or expect to be awarded) a taught Masters (or international equivalent) in a relevant subject.

### **Conditional and unconditional offers**

Offers to study at Goldsmiths are either conditional or unconditional. A conditional offer means you still need to meet the requirements for the programme - for example, exam results, English language requirements or other conditions such as a portfolio of work. We will specify any such requirements on our programme pages or in your offer letter or email.

An unconditional offer means you've got a place, and have met the conditions of your offer. This may be because you already have your exam results and/or English language test.

Fees, funding and applying



### <u>Visa types</u>

Depending on how long you aim to study with us, and the kind of course you want to complete, it is likely that you will need a student visa. There are two main types:

### **Short Term Study visa**

This used to be called a Student Visitor visa, and allows you to study for a maximum of six months in any year. It's the right type of visa if you are only planning to study one course with us that lasts less than six months. You can't work if you have a Short Term Study visa. You can study full or part time with this type of visa. You can find out lots more on the IAS web pages: <a href="https://www.gold.ac.uk/gls/immigration">www.gold.ac.uk/gls/immigration</a>

### Tier 4 (General) visa

This is the most common type of student visa, and is for students studying full-time with Goldsmiths. The IAS can help you apply for a Tier 4 visa. If you are applying overseas, you can take part in dedicated web chats to ask about the visa application process. ### **Guidance and support**

If you are applying for your visa overseas, we will write to you at each step of the application process with important visa information and will support you through the process. You can also sign up for our special immigration web chats. If you are able to apply for a Tier 4 visa inside the UK, the IAS will do this with you.

If you are coming to the UK for more than six months and are from outside the European Economic Area (EEA) you probably need a visa to study with us. You can speak to our Immigration Advisory Service (IAS) if you are unsure. The IAS can help you apply for the right type of visa for your course.



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### FEES AND FUNDING



### Please note

Tuition fees are subject to annual review and are likely to increase each year. This means for a programme that is more than one year long, a similar fee (adjusted for inflation) will be charged in subsequent years.



### **Fees**

Our tuition fees vary from programme to programme. At the time of going to print, our 2016 entry tuition fees had not yet been set. Our 2015 fees can be used as guidance, but the majority of fees will increase year on year. Until our 2016 fees are announced, details of our 2015 fees can be found on programme listings on pages 73-125 and at www.gold.ac.uk/fees-funding

The UK government classifies a student's fee status as either 'home/EU' or 'international'. To find out your fee status you can visit the UK Council for International Student Affairs (UKCISA) website www.ukcisa.org.uk

### **Paving vour fees**

Fees given are per year and are shown, and must be paid, in pounds sterling, unless agreed otherwise. Tuition fees are due at or before enrolment. The payment of your annual tuition fees can be spread over a series of direct debit payments, starting in October 2016. You can also pay by cheque and most major credit cards or online.

### **Early Payment Discount Scheme**

If the tuition fee for your programme is £6,700 or more and you pay your fee in full by the last Friday in the August before enrolment, you are entitled to a discount of 2.5% on the fee due. For details visit www.gold.ac.uk/student-services/tuition-fees

### Advanced fee payments

All self-financed students who are 'international' for the purposes of tuition fees are asked to pay an advanced payment of tuition fees of £3,000 by May (prior to starting a degree programme the following September) to secure their admission.

This money is deducted from your total fee liability for the academic year, and if you do require a Tier 4 visa, we will list the payment on your Confirmation of Acceptance of Studies (CAS) statement.

Self-financing is defined as any student without a UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) defined official sponsor. Official sponsors include any university, government, international organisation or company. Full details will be sent with your offer of a place at Goldsmiths. ### **Funding**

### Funding and visa requirements

International students can usually only study full-time programmes, depending on the terms of their visa. If you require a Tier 4 student visa the UK government requires you to be able to demonstrate that you have sufficient funds to meet your tuition and maintenance costs. See living costs information below.

### **Federal loan students**

Goldsmiths participates in the American Federal Loan Program. American students funded by this programme should apply for loans early to make sure that the first disbursement is available at enrolment. Federal loan cheques are in US dollars and cannot be disbursed before the start of term. You should therefore ensure you have sufficient funds to cover your first week. Canadian students are also able to use their government loans towards their studies at Goldsmiths.

### **Living costs**

If you require a Tier 4 student visa you will need to demonstrate to the UKVI that you can cover your living costs as well as your fees when you make your visa application. For most students, applying for a visa to study with us in 2016/17 is £11,385 a year plus fees (at the time of printing). The cost of living and studying in London can be higher than some parts of the UK, although Goldsmiths' location in South-East London means that the cost is lower than in central London. If you have a Tier 4 student visa, you will only usually be able to work for 20 hours during the week in term time, and full-time in vacation periods. # **Full Study Abroad year**

The full Study Abroad year is one academic year (nine months) comprising three terms: two teaching terms of 12 weeks each - the Autumn and Spring terms - and a third six-week period of examinations - the Summer term. This option is the most flexible and opens up a huge choice of undergraduate degree modules at Goldsmiths. You can create a study programme from a range of disciplines or take a more focused approach by choosing to specialise in a single discipline.

# Full Study Abroad year plus English for non-native speakers

This option is for students who require intensive English language preparation in addition to academic study. The timing suits students from countries where the academic year begins in April, for example Japan, and also enables students to be at home for the job-hunting season, which often starts in January. English language entry requirements can be found on our website.


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



# Why study economics at Goldsmiths?

Our economics degree offers a different approach. One that provides formal training in economic theory and application, but which also allows you to choose a complementary specialism that best suits you.

You'll major in economics, and choose one of four minor specialisms: people and society; concepts, ideas and perspectives; communication and technology; or markets and organisation.

Core teaching covers maths and statistics, economic reasoning, finance and accounting, the history of economic thought, quantitative methods and data analysis, and communication and presentation skills.

You'll also have a work placement opportunity in your second year. This will enhance your CV, bring theory and practical experience together, and help you develop industry contacts.



# Why study history at Goldsmiths?

You will encounter subjects you might not find at other universities, and investigate the diversity of human life through themes like madness, medicine, revolution, empires, religious beliefs, identities and the body.

You will explore history through written material, visual and oral sources - so you might examine Russian history through film, art and literature, or the history of World War I by visiting its battlefields and monuments.

With our optional History at Work module for undergraduates, you'll have the opportunity to work on placement in a leading heritage environment. This could give you invaluable experience in areas like conservation, exhibition building, or archiving at one of our partner organisations.

You can take advantage of Goldsmiths' location and its place as part of the University of London with access to great libraries and the city's vast range of historical sources. Many of our modules include visits to London's museums, archives and galleries.
