
Enterprising students

SMALL, CONNECTED CAMPUS

Goldsmiths is based in New Cross, South-East London. It's in zone 2 (central London is zone 1), and about five minutes by train from London Bridge. It's only 15 minutes by Overground train from the nightlife of East London. So you're just minutes away from the heart of this great global city.

Our fascinating campus is made up of listed and traditional buildings, modern spaces, and even a repurposed church and town hall. It's a great metaphor for Goldsmiths itself – diverse, curious, and inventive.

<u>Our campus</u>

We're lucky to have one small, friendly campus in New Cross, with all lectures, tutorials and the Students' Union here. Many of our halls of residence (page 31) are within walking distance, so it's easy to meet friends and enjoy a close-knit student community. So you get the best of London and a great single-campus experience.

<u>New Cross</u>

The Guardian said, "there's a definite buzz around the Peckham-Camberwell-Deptford triangle these days, and New Cross is at its centre." New Cross has many great places to eat, from Chinwag (for burgers, salads and brunch) to the London Particular, specialising in seasonal and healthy food. At the Amersham Arms you can enjoy top stand-up comedy and live bands, or to escape the bustle of the busy New Cross Road head up to Telegraph Hill, for a park and amazing views. Explore other New Cross landmarks at www.gold.ac.uk/local

There are plenty of interesting neighbourhoods around New Cross, full of exciting nightlife, tranquil parks and bustling markets. Here are a few nearby gems.

<u>Deptford</u>

A 10-minute walk from Goldsmiths, Deptford Market holds all the wonders of the world's cuisine, and some treats for bargain lovers. There's a strong creative community, with many galleries and filmmakers working in the area. You can see some of the best at the Deptford X arts festival - www.deptfordx.org

<u>Greenwich</u>

Home of the Cutty Sark and Henry VIII's favourite London residence, Greenwich is a jewel of South-East London. There are markets, cinemas, bars, comedy nights, the Maritime Museum and a huge Royal Park to enjoy. And when you get tired of all that, you can take a stroll along the Thames.

Brockley

Nearby Brockley is home to many students and young professionals, with lots of independent bars and shops. There's a fantastic weekly food market and one of London's best fringe theatres, Brockley Jack. You may also spot a celebrity or two walking their dog on Hilly Fields, which has great views across the city.

<u>Peckham</u>

The fact the local newspaper is called 'The Peckham Peculiar' says a lot about this 'in vogue' area. It's a hot pot of street food, bargain cinema, late-night bars, boutiques and pound shops. So you can buy everything from African land snails to happy-hour cocktails, all within a few minutes of each other.

Camberwell

Just beyond Peckham is 'high-rise and historic' Camberwell, with a good mix of student-friendly bars popular with many Goldsmiths students. The South London Gallery with its cosy café is well worth a visit, and within a square kilometre you can find restaurants offering food from Italy to Ethiopia.

Brixton

Also worth exploring is Brixton. From the small independent bars and eateries of Brixton Village to well-loved venues like Dogstar, the O2 Academy and Plan B, the whole area is relatively free from high street chains, and so guarantees a night out that's a bit different.




ACCOMMODATION

Studying in an exciting city like London is a fantastic experience. And it's even better when you know you're living somewhere safe, comfortable and affordable.

Goldsmiths offers a range of accommodation options - whether you prefer the supported environment of halls of residence on or near campus, or more independent living that lets you mix with a wider London student population.





Halls of residence

We offer self-catered accommodation with single occupancy rooms within an easy commute of the campus; many halls are within walking distance of Goldsmiths (see the map on pages 28-29 for details). Some studio flats are also available. Rent includes most utility bills and basic possessions insurance, and staff are on hand 24/7. The halls are managed by Goldsmiths or in partnership with a private provider.

Once you've applied for a place at Goldsmiths, we'll send you more information about applying for halls of residence.

Flats and houses leased by the University of London

Accommodation in flats and houses can be found and managed for you by University of London Housing Services (ULHS). This means you can live independently with the reassurance of having ULHS as your landlord. Rents are competitive, and you can choose to live close to the Goldsmiths campus.

Privately rented flats and houses

Renting your own flat or house means you decide where you live, who you share with, and the type of accommodation you want. South-East London is relatively cheap compared to other parts of the capital.

FACILITIES

Our single site campus means you won't have to wander far to get to some impressive facilities - from a 24/7 Library, to open-access computers with the latest software.

Events

From conferences on vampires to improvised music concerts, we've got thought-provoking talks, performances and exhibitions taking place every day around campus. And in the summer months, you can enjoy the lively buzz of the Goldsmiths degree shows, featuring the work of graduating students from a range of subjects including music, art and design (www.gold.ac.uk/degree-shows).

Enhancing your learning

Our Library has been ranked in the UK's top 20 for facilities and opening hours*. It's open 24 hours a day during term time, and has lots of space for individual and group study. As a Goldsmiths student, you can also borrow books from the University of London Library, Senate House and from other institutions within the University of London.

We have PC and Mac computers around the campus, but mostly in the Rutherford Building (home to the Library too). And you can access the web, your College email and shared files remotely using our campus wireless network. Our virtual learning environment, 'Learn.Gold', gives you access to online learning activities and materials.

You can borrow audio-visual equipment like cameras, lighting equipment and projectors from our Media Equipment Centre. Our Digital Media Suite provides video and audio editing software and sound-proof editing booths. We also have an in-house print room, which offers digital printing and finishing services -perfect for producing things like colour portfolios and other creative work.

Department facilities

Many of our academic departments have their own facilities including:

- Studio space and research labs for casting, constructed textiles, fine art printmaking, media research, metal, photography, print and dye, stitch and fabric, and woodwork in the Department of Art
- Workshops with the latest digital equipment, computing suites and studio space in the Department of Design
- Photography, radio and TV studios in the Department of Media and Communications, as well as the latest digital video and audio editing equipment, ENPS (essential news production system) facilities, animation and image manipulation software and hardware
- Pioneering sound studios (including the Electronic Music Studio), a commercialstandard recording studio, and numerous performance opportunities and activities in the Department of Music
- Research laboratories including EEG and brain stimulation labs for neuroscience research, an infant lab, and a visual perception and attention laboratory - in the Department of Psychology
- A 160-seat theatre, performance studios, a scenography workshop, wardrobe and props stores in the Department of Theatre and Performance
- Labs with the latest technologies and software in the Department of Computing

Eating and drinking

There are lots of places to eat and drink on campus - whether you want to grab a coffee, take away a snack, or sit down for a hot meal with friends. They include:

- The Refectory, a newly refurbished canteen
- Loafers Café and The Pod, serving food and Costa coffee
- Professor Stuart Hall Building Café, for hot meals overlooking the picturesque College Green
- Library Café, for Fairtrade snacks and drinks while you study
- Students' Union Shop, offering snacks, drinks and toiletries
- Natura, a vegan café in the Union

You'll also find a diverse range of restaurants, cafés and shops just a few minutes' walk from Goldsmiths around New Cross.

Sports

We have facilities for sports on campus and nearby, and at the centre of Goldsmiths is our College Green, which is used for things like football and rugby. We also have:

- · Tennis and netball courts
- Clubpulse gym, which offers subsidised membership, 90 fitness stations, a dance studio and a great range of classes
- Loring Hall sports ground in nearby Sidcup



Welcome week

Each September, to welcome new students, we host a week packed full of events - from official inductions to campus tours and a Freshers' Fayre. You'll have a great time meeting other new students and getting to know the campus and everything Goldsmiths has to offer.

<u>Your academic</u> department

You'll have a personal tutor in your department to support you academically and advise you on other support services. There's also a Departmental Student Coordinator - a fellow student who is there to represent you on academic issues.

<u>Peer assisted</u> <u>learning (PAL)</u>

The PAL team provides an extra level of support to new students. They're students like you, who can call on their own experience to help you get the most out of your first year. The team works in groups in each department to run workshops, social events, academic visits, drop-ins and one-to-ones. They can help you get to grips with lectures, build confidence about speaking in seminars and discussion groups, learn how to use and understand academic language, and how to present your work effectively. They're also a friendly face and a source of advice whenever you need it. You can even chat to the PAL team before you arrive at Goldsmiths - find out more at www.gold.ac.uk/pal

Academic writing

Need advice on your academic writing? The Centre for English Language and Academic Writing runs sessions on academic literacy, study skills, and language development. You can also book an hour with one of our resident Royal Literary Fellows - professional writers who can help you improve your essay-writing skills.

<u>Chaplaincy</u>

The Chaplaincy is a multi-faith team here for everyone, regardless of religious beliefs and practices. They welcome anyone who wants someone to talk to, or just spend time with.

Health

If you live in halls of residence or close to campus you can register at one of several nearby surgeries. There's also an NHS Walk-in Centre open 365 days a year. Welfare

From checking your housing contract and helping with budgeting, to giving support if you're struggling with essay deadlines, the Students' Union can provide confidential advice on lots of things. There's also a dedicated Welfare and Diversity Officer and an Education Officer based in the Union.

The Student Centre

The Student Centre provides a wide range of services and support in one location.

There are specialist staff who can assist you with any problems, and who run events and activities to help you make the most out of your time at Goldsmiths. If you have any questions, get in touch and they'll point you in the right direction.

Advice

We have a confidential service, where staff can support you with welfare matters like finance, consumer issues, and housing. They can also assist you with your student loan enquiries, and help you access discretionary funding in cases of hardship.

Learning support

This team can advise you about any aspect of disability, including the support and accommodations available to make sure you have full access to the teaching and learning on your degree. They can also support students who may need assistance due to a temporary illness or injury, or who may need additional learning support for any other reason. Why study psychology at Goldsmiths?

At Goldsmiths, our degrees are interactive and inclusive and cover both core psychological theory and research. You will learn about the social, developmental, biological and cognitive aspects of psychology, and you will also explore a wide range of options, such as behavioural genetics, neurodevelopmental disorders, psychopathology, evolutionary psychology, cognitive neuroscience, psychology and law, anomalistic psychology and educational psychology.

You'll be taught by experts in the field, and have the opportunity to get involved in the world-class research taking place in the department.





FEES

A degree is an investment in your future, and while the tuition fees may seem sizeable, you'll be developing the knowledge, skills and experience you'll need for an exciting future.

We publish the undergraduate tuition fees for 2016 entry in autumn 2015 (you can check www.gold.ac.uk/ug/fees-funding for the latest information). As a guide, the fees for 2015 entry were £9,000 per academic year for full-time home and EU students.

If you're studying full-time:

- You won't have to pay up-front for tuition. If you're a UK or EU student, in most cases a tuition fee loan paid direct to Goldsmiths will cover your fees.
- to help with living costs.
- Government grants, which you don't UK students to help with living costs. These depend on your household income.
- your loan until you've left university
- Your monthly repayment rate is based on how much you earn. You pay 9p for every pound you earn over £21,000. For example, if your salary is £25,000 a year, you'll pay 9% of £4.000, which works out as £6.92 a week.

If you're a part-time student, you're eligible at least 25% of an equivalent full-time course

FUNDING

The costs involved in coming to university can seem overwhelming at first. That's why, every year, we offer a range of scholarships, bursaries and fee waivers that can help you fund your studies.

We announce our scholarships and bursaries for 2016 entry in March 2016. As a guide, here's what we offered for 2015 entry:

- 10 x full tuition fee waivers (worth £27.000 each) for students in our
- for students in neighbouring boroughs
- 20 x bursaries to cover the cost of an annual travelcard
- 10 x £3,000 for students over the age of 25

- 4 x £4.500 for students with a disability
- 5 x £4,000 for students who are care leavers
- 1 x full tuition fee waiver (worth £27,000) for a refugee or asylum seeker
